News from around the courthouse

2011 has been a year of change and challenge for the Court system. 2012 will bring a few more changes and some of the same challenges. Here are a few highlights:

Judges: Judge Steven L. Price retired effective January 1, 2012. Appointed to the bench in March 1996, Judge Price has served in the areas of criminal, family, and juvenile law. Most recently Price has presided over the domestic violence deferred sentencing, and domestic violence probation violation dockets as well as general trial duties. Until a new judge is appointed by Governor Kitzhaber, Judge Price will be his own Plan B replacement for the first few weeks of the year. We wish him well, and look forward to seeing him from time to time in the coming years as he does his Plan B service. Judge Price's many duties will be finding new homes among current judges. Judge Upton will step into the ongoing Position One/ Probation Violation rotation along with Judge Knapp. Judges Fun and Wipper will share responsibility for the Domestic Violence Deferred Sentencing and Domestic Violence Probation Violation docket. Judge Kohl will be taking over the Post Conviction Relief docket.

Video Conferencing Carts

Three (3) *new* video conferencing carts are available for use in courtrooms. Video conferencing carts - pre-positioned in storage closets in the Courthouse, Justice Services Building and Juvenile Services Building - may be used for in-custody defendant/inmate court appearances from jail/prison, remote testimony by witnesses, etc. First come, first serve reservations are required. Call Court Administration at 503.846.8767 to reserve a Video Conferencing Cart.

<u>Digital Projector, DVD/VCR Player and Speaker</u> <u>Carts and Screen</u>

Two (2) carts with a digital projector, DVD/VCR

player and speakers are available for use in court-rooms. These Digital Projector Carts - prepositioned in storage closets in the Courthouse and Justice Services Building - are commonly used by attorneys with laptop computers containing Power-Point presentations, animations, videos, documents, pictures, audio files etc. First come, first serve reservations are required. Call Court Administration at 503.846.8767 to reserve a Digital Projector Cart and screen.

Document Camera

One (1) high quality document camera (commonly called an ELMO) is available for use in courtrooms. The document camera plugs into the digital projector and displays documents, pictures, evidence, X-rays and transparencies on a screen. First come, first serve reservations are required. Call Court Administration at 503.846.8767 to reserve the document camera, Digital Projector Cart and screen.

TV/DVD/VCR Carts

Carts with a TV and DVD/VCR player are available for use. No advance reservation is required. Court-room clerks can retrieve a cart for your use on short notice - they are pre-positioned in storage closets in the Courthouse, Justice Services Building and Juvenile Services Building.

Judicial assignments: The 14 judges on the bench are assigned in different teams based on case categories. Judges Nachtigal, Bailey, Knapp, Kohl, Upton, Letourneau, Fun, and Wipper make up the general trial team, hearing criminal and civil matters. Judge Raines, Erwin, Cobb, Letourneau, and Butterfield are on the Family Law Team. Judge Butterfield is serving in Juvenile Court with Referee/Pro Tem Michele Rini. Judge Cobb handles the probate docket with the assistance of the new probate commissioner Stephanie Schilling. Judges Fun and Wipper are sharing the LEC docket in two month rotations. Judges Knapp and Upton will share the PV docket in one-month rotations. Judges Bailey, Letourneau, Wipper and Fun will hear civil motions. Judges Upton and Bailey continue to share the DUII diversion and enhanced bench probation duties. The court continues to rely on volunteer pro tem judges to hear Small Claims and contested Family Abuse Protection Act hearings when the case is not consolidated with a domestic relations case.

Arbitration: Judge Butterfield convened an arbitration commission which met and worked through 2011. The Arbitration Commission recommended to

the court that arbitrators' fees be increased comparable to neighboring jurisdictions. As a result, arbitration fees for cases referred after January 3, 2012 will have fees of \$175 per hour up to a maximum of \$1,050 per case.

Brownbag CLEs: The Court sponsored and hosted three brownbag CLE lunches in 2011. Topics included Criminal Sentencing, Interstate Compact for Supervision of Adult Offenders, and Arbitration. The Court will be looking for other topics of interest for short, free, lunch-hour CLEs from time to time in 2012.

Defense Attorneys appearing at arraignment: The Office of Public Defense Services awarded a contract to Metropolitan Public Defenders a contract to represent all defendants at arraignment in Washington County beginning in January 2012. MPD began appearing at arraignments with in-custody defendants in December 2011. The Sheriff's office, District Attorney, MPD, and Court have worked together to create a protocol for providing a summary of important information to all parties regarding the case and defendant at the time of arraignment. MPD won't be trial counsel for all of these folks, so defense providers have created a system to get information to trial counsel and see that the case is properly assigned.

Budget woes: Like all courts throughout Oregon, Washington County is anticipating budget difficulties in the second half of the biennium. We have already been required to reduce our budgeted staff numbers from 104 FTE employees to 94 FTE employees, and we will be taking a total of 5 furlough days in 2012, and 3 furlough days in the first six months of 2013. We anticipate that additional cuts will be required after the legislature meets in February 2012. Significant portions of the Judicial budget are pass-through funds, debt-service, or are constitutionally protected. The bulk of the rest of the budget comes from personnel costs meaning that the court will face additional staff reductions
